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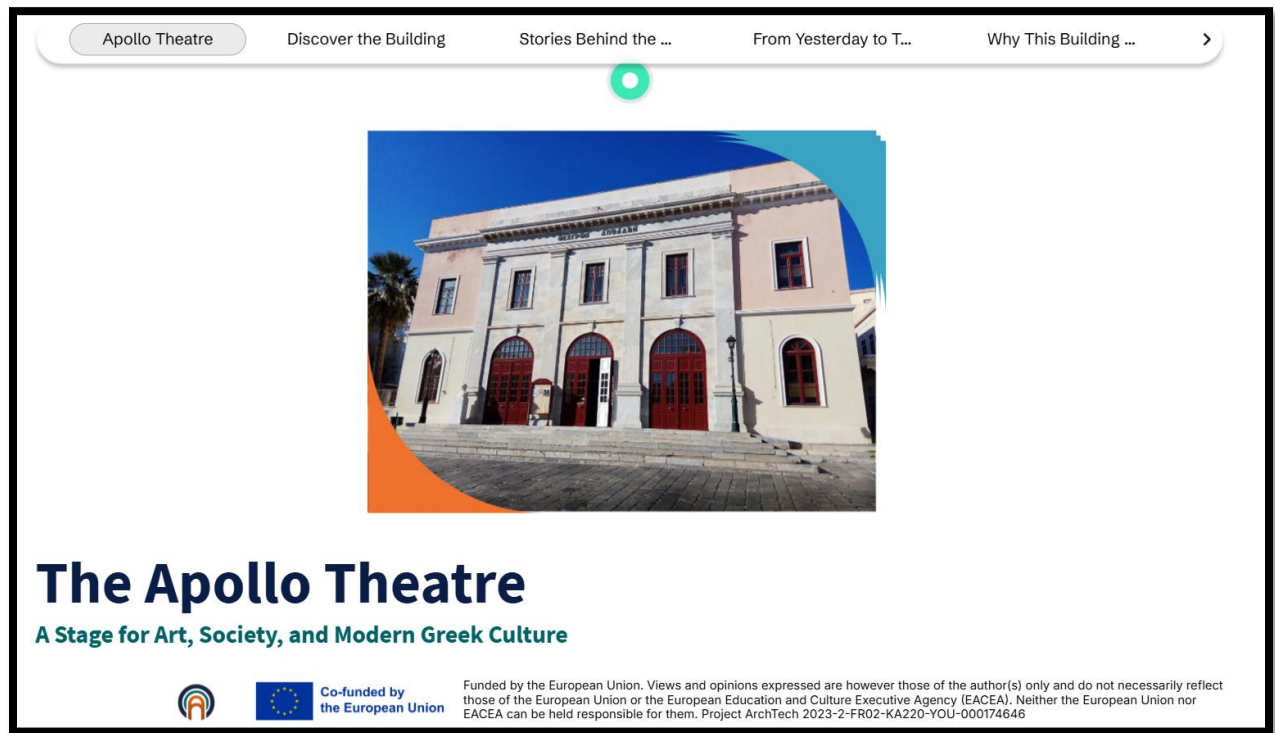

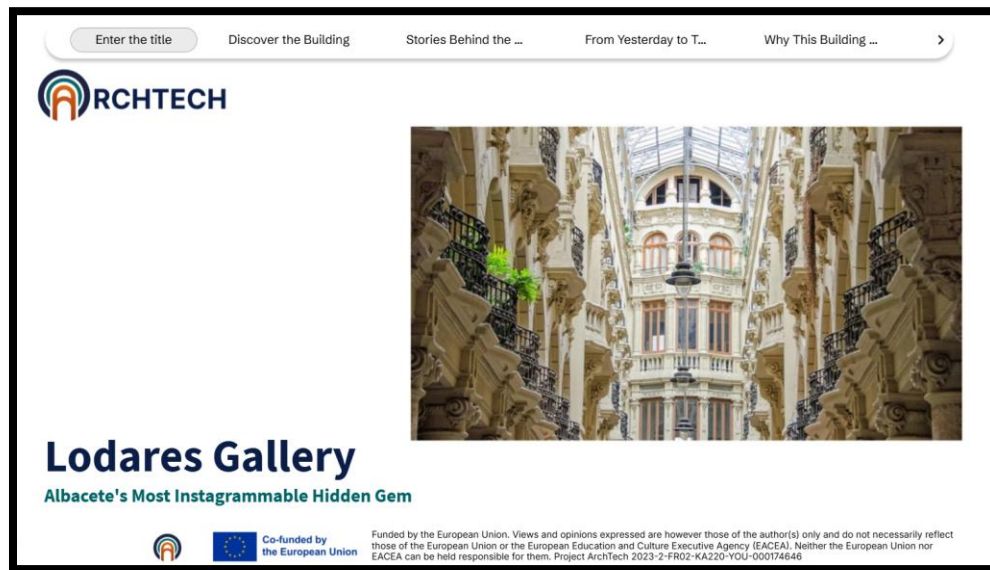
Across the partnership, **60 digital narratives** have been created, each highlighting an important but often overlooked architectural site. Here is a small preview of what users can discover through the app.

Greece: The Apollo Theatre (Syros)



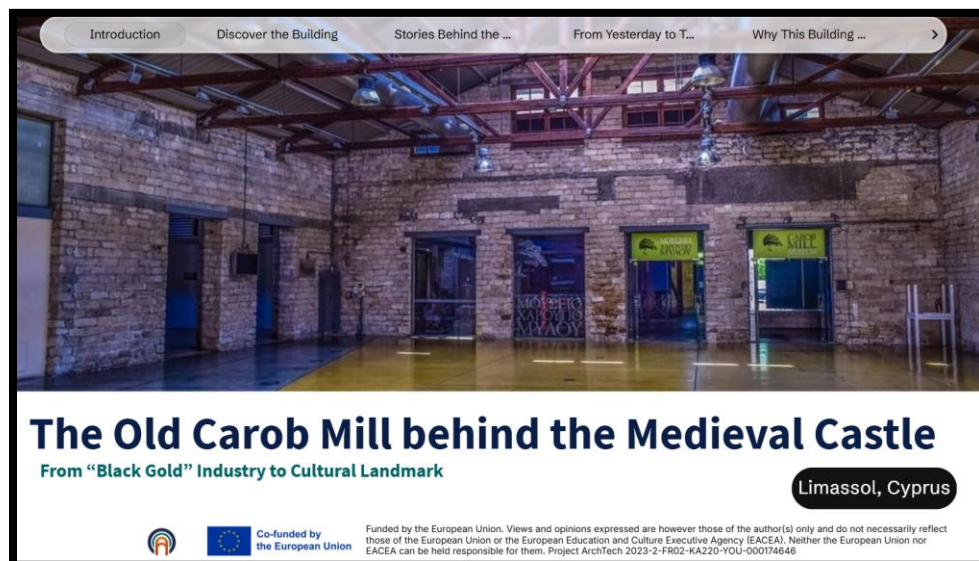
Located in the heart of Ermoupoli on the island of Syros, the **Apollo Theatre** is one of Greece's finest examples of 19th-century architecture. Inspired by Italy's renowned opera houses, this elegant theatre has served as a cultural landmark for generations. Its digital narrative reveals how the building became a symbol of the island's artistic life and why it continues to play a central role in preserving local cultural identity.

Spain: Pasaje Lodaresh

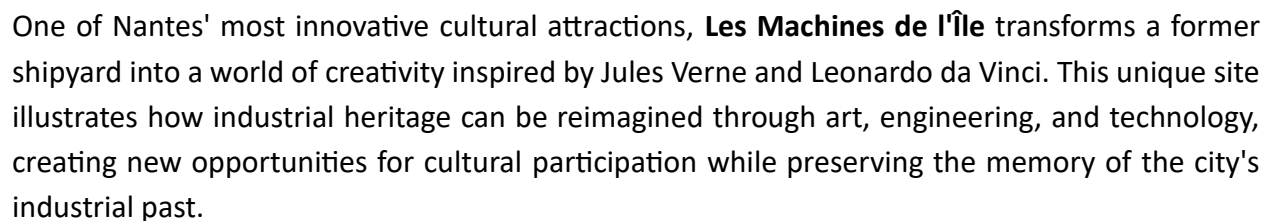


Often regarded as one of Spain's most beautiful shopping arcades, **Pasaje Lodaresh** in Albacete combines Modernist architecture with early twentieth-century urban design. Beneath its impressive glass roof and ornate ironwork lies the story of a city embracing progress while preserving architectural elegance. The narrative showcases how commercial spaces can also become cultural landmarks.

Standing at the entrance to Valletta, **Palazzo Ferreria** reflects Malta's rich architectural and historical influences. Built during the British period on the site of the former armoury of the Knights of St John, the palace blends neoclassical and Victorian styles into one distinctive landmark. Through its digital narrative, users discover how the building has evolved alongside Malta's history while remaining an integral part of the city's urban identity.
